Israeli Author Renounces Citizenship, **Calls on Others to Follow Suit**

WEST BANK (Dispatches) - Avi Steinberg, an Israeli-born author, has announced that he had formally renounced his 'Israeli citizenship'.

Justifying his decision in an article for the left-leaning news publication Truthout, Steinberg said that the Zionist regime's citizenship had "always been a tool of genocide" that legitimized settlers colonial-

"Israeli citizenship is predicated on the worst kinds of violent crimes we know of, and on a deepening litany of lies intended to whitewash those crimes," he wrote in the op-

The author was born in Al-Quds to American parents and raised in an ultra-Orthodox setting. In 1993, his family moved back to the U.S., first to Cleveland and then to Boston, where his father got a job as a director at Harvard University.

Steinberg cited a number of laws

regime's founding that legitimized colonialism and discrimination, including the 1948 so-called Declaration of Independence, the Law of Return in 1950, and the 1952 Citizenship Law.

He argued that this paper trail was shaped by the 1948 Nakba, when Zionist troops expelled approxi-

passed following the occupying mately 80 percent of the Palestinian population from their homeland, and the subsequent efforts by the settlers to secure international rec-

"These are forged documents," Steinberg said. "The look of officialdom... [is] nothing other than this state's slippery effort to conceal its fundamental unlawfulness."

Explaining his parents' migration, Steinberg described the cognitive dissonance that allowed his parents "to become both American liberals who opposed the U.S. invasion of Vietnam, while also acting as armed settlers of another people's land".

Steinberg was later to discover that the house he grew up in was owned by a Palestinian family who were violently expelled to Jordan and barred from returning.

"This 1-to-1 replacement was not a secret," Steinberg explained. Rather, it was a selling point to Israeli settlers drawn to the picturesque "native Arab charm" of these villages bereft from "actual native

Steinberg's comments come as an increasing number of Jewish Americans have criticized the Zionist regime's actions, with many joining or founding Jewish-led pro-Palestinian organizations.

between leader Xi Jinping and Russian President Vladimir Putin in a reminder of growing closeness between two leaders who face tensions with the West.

Xi told Putin that their countries will "always move forward hand in hand," the official Xinhua News Agency said Tues-

China has maintained ties and robust trade with Russia since the latter invaded Ukraine in 2022, helping to offset Western sanctions and attempts to isolate Pu-

China's leader in his prerecorded New Year's Eve address said the country has "deepened solidarity and cooperation with the global South" while praising the "responsible" role it has played with "the world in turmoil."

Xi also said China's economy, which has slowed down in recent years, was "improving and recovering."

He also addressed Taiwan, the self-ruled island claimed by Beijing. "We Chinese on both sides of the Taiwan Strait belong to one and the same family. No one can ever sever the bond of kinship between us," Xi said.

In his address to the nation, Putin said that Russia has responded to the most difficult challenges and will be moving forward next year.

"We set big goals for ourselves and achieved them, and we overcame difficulties more than once because we were together. This is how our unity and our faith in ourselves and our strengths and capabilities grew stronger," he said.

Putin praised troops fighting in Ukraine as "the true heroes who have taken on the great task of defending Russia and providing the solid guarantees of peace and security for our people."

Hours before Germany rings in the new vear, Chancellor Olaf Scholz called on the country's 84 million residents to stick together despite the many global crises and wars, the country's ailing economy and a deadly Christmas market attack that shocked the nation.

"We are a country of togetherness. And we can draw strength from this - especially in difficult times like these," Scholz said in his prerecorded speech.

With a storm bringing bitter weather to other parts of the United Kingdom, festivities in Edinburgh, Scotland - including the Hogmanay Street party, garden concert and castle pyrotechnics show - were already canceled.

Celebrations will echo around the globe as the New Year arrives in different time zones, with American Samoa among the last to welcome 2025 a full 24 hours after New Zealand.

acknowledged that blocking Damascus's access to its oil resources is part of a deliberate pressure campaign, preventing the Syrian government from obtaining revenue needed for reconstruction.

While some Kurdish militants regarded as U.S. proxies have been permitted to sell oil locally, the majority of Syrians have been cut off from their country's own resources. This has contributed to a devastating economic crisis, with severe fuel shortages affecting civilian life, heating, transportation and essential services.

The new regime led by Abu Muhammad al-Julani faces multiple challenges in its plans. Beyond the U.S. occupation of vital oil infrastructure, the country contin-

ues to endure Israeli airstrikes and international sanctions. Diab appealed for the lifting of sanctions, arguing that "there is no point in Israel and its supporters accountable for grave violations of international law. Syria's oil resources are primarily concentrated in two regions: the north east particularly in Hasakah, and the east along the River Euphrates to the Iraqi border near Davr al-Zawr, with additional small fields south of Raqqa. Gas resourc-

es extend to Palmyra in central Syria, al-

though access to these resources remains

complicated by foreign military presence.

In a 2023 vote the U.S. Senate reinforced its position, voting 84-13 against withdrawing troops from Syria, suggesting that American forces will continue to maintain their grip on Syria's oil infrastructure for the foreseeable future, despite the country's desperate need for resources to rebuild after years of devastating conflict.

Pezeshkian emphasized that instead of relying on general prescriptions, it is essential to focus on solving specific problems and to avoid vague statements. He highlighted that social welfare is currently one of the most pressing matters faced by the government, which is discussed in weekly council meetings.

Pezeshkian urged that these discussions should prioritize concrete solutions rather than generalizations, particularly concerning issues such as housing and the livelihoods of the underprivileged.

The president also announced a plan to address the shortage of classrooms and schools in remote areas, which would be implemented with the participation of the public, philanthropists, and a nationwide mobilization aimed at reducing educational inequality. Pezeshkian expressed optimism that this issue will be completely resolved within the next year.

At the conclusion of this interview, the president emphasized the significance of unity and cohesion inside the country. "If the people believe that the government is working hard to address their problems, no enemy will be able to harm the country. Unity among the branches of gov ernment and adherence to the policies of the Leader can effectively manage all the challenges ahead," he stated.

"Therefore, Iran categorically denies any violation of arms embargoes or any involvement in fueling the conflict in Yemen or elsewhere," he stated.

Iran's UN ambassador went on to describe it as both deeply troubling and highly ironic that the U.S. and Britain, instead of upholding their responsibilities as permanent members of the Security Council to maintain international peace and security, persist in providing political cover and military support for Israel's reckless actions and violations while fabricating baseless accusations against Iran

Report: Advisors Wanted Blair to Rein in Bush in Iraq

LONDON (Guardian) -- Tony Blair's advisers privately questioned if the U.S. had "proper political control" of military operations in Iraq after a senior U.S. official confided that George W Bush believed he was on a "mission from God" against Iraqi insurgents, newly released documents reveal. Blair needed to "deliver some difficult

messages" to the then U.S. president for a "more measured approach" in April 2004, following a U.S. military operation to suppress a major uprising in the city of Falluja, according to papers released to the National Archives in Kew, west London.

In a surprisingly candid conversation, recorded in a document marked "please protect very carefully", Richard "Rich" Armitage, then U.S. deputy secretary of state, told Sir David Manning, then UK ambassador, that Bush had needed a "dose of reality" after demanding U.S. forces "kick ass" in Falluja, where U.S. troops were engaged in a bloody battle with Iraqi militants after four private military contractors were ambushed and killed.

Armitage appealed to Blair to use his influence in a forthcoming visit to Washington on April 16 to urge Bush to deal with Falluja "as part of a carefully judged political process"

The U.S. had launched Operation Vigilant Resolve in Falluja after the mutilated bodies of the U.S. contractors were hung from a bridge over the Euphrates River less than one year after the May 2003 overthrow of the Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein.

Bush had initially been influenced by his military generals and "wanted to kick ass" with U.S. marines occupying the city. But politicians on the coalition provisional authority, set up after Saddam's fall, feared the U.S. military response could damage hopes of establishing an independent Iraqi administration.

Bush backed off after being "faced with this 'dose of reality", Manning reported back to No 10.

"Rich summed it all up by saying Bush still thought he was on some sort of mission from God. But that recent events had made him 'rather more sober'."

Bush had famously declared "mission accomplished" after the overthrow of Hussein by U.S. and UK coalition forces. But the White House has previously dismissed as "absurd" reports that Bush privately told a Palestinian delegation in 2003 that God spoke to him and said: "George, go fight these terrorists in Afghanistan" and "George, go and end the tyranny in Iraq."

Armitage dismissed claims by the overall U.S. commander in Iraq, Gen John Abizaid, that he could put down the Falluja uprising within days as "bullshit" and "politically crass". Armitage believed the U.S. was "gradually losing on the battlefield" and that it was "inevitable" the administration would have to send more troops, which would be "politically ugly" for Bush, Manning reported.

No 10 was nervous about the U.S. military response. A briefing document, ahead of Blair's Washington visit in April 2004, said events in Falluja had "used up a great deal of the coalition's political capital".

"Publicly we will want to underline our continued commitment to seeing the task through, but privately we will need to deliver some difficult messages to Bush about the need for a more measured approach by the US military, under proper political oversight, and the need for a clear end to the occupation on July 1," it said.

It added: "The prime minister might question Bush on whether there is proper political control of military operations," and concluded: "In short, too many military officers talking tough to a U.S. audience, with little attention to the effect on an Iraqi or regional audience."

Blair's foreign policy adviser, Sir Nigel Sheinwald, described the UK's main concerns in a memo to the prime minister as "clumsy U.S. handling", "disproportionate U.S. military tactics - what they did in Falluja looked on Iraqi TV screens to be a form of collective punishment" and "apocalyptic media treatment".

The U.S. lost 27 troops, while about 200 insurgents and 600 Iraqi civilians were thought to have been killed in Falluja at that time. Coalition forces took the city in a second offensive launched in November 2004. U.S. troops remained in Iraq until

Hamas Slams House Demolitions in Al-Quds as 'Displacement Plan'

WEST BANK (Dispatches) - The Islamic resistan ce movement Hamas says that the Zionist regime's escalation of the demolition of Palestinian homes and facilities in the West Bank and Al-Quds is part of its "displacement plan" to Judaize the territory, the Palestinian Information Centre has reported.

Hamas added that the issue of orders to demolish 13 homes in the town of Anata, east of Al-Quds, is part of this plan and a settlement expansion policy that threatens the existence of the Palestinian people on their land. The plan includes the forced displacement and abuse of citizens in both the West Bank and Gaza.

The movement called on the Palestinian people in the occupied West Bank to challenge the occupation regime and confront its aggressive plans to Judaize the city of Al-Quds and destroy the religious sanctities therein. It also called on the Arab League and the Organiza-

tion of Islamic Cooperation to

take immediate action to protect

Al-Quds and Al-Aqsa Mosque from the dangers of the occupying regime's Judaization.

Palestinians in Al-Quds are subjected to repressive and racist policies aimed at forcing them to leave their homes and properties in their home city. The purpose of this is to allow the occupation regime to seize their properties and use them for illegal settlement projects. All of Israel's settlements and the settlers who live in them are illegal under the Fourth Geneva

Convention.

According to data from the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), the Israeli occupation authorities demolished 1,787 Palestinian facilities between October 7, 2023, and October 15, 2024, including 800 inhabited homes. The demolitions resulted in

the displacement of 4,498 Palestinians, in addition to affecting 532,000 others as a result of the demolition of their homes or their commercial, industrial and agricultural facilities.
